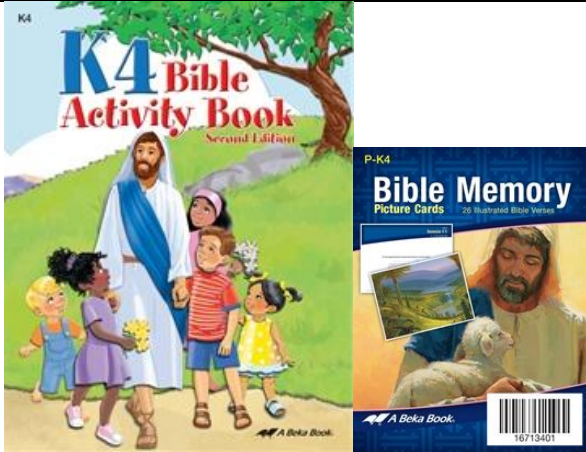


# K4 Curriculum

## Bible



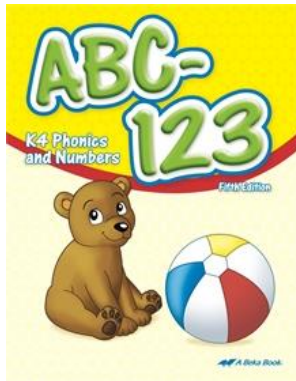
Bible stories are taught from both the Old and New Testaments with colorful visuals. Students take home lovely memory verse cards that help them remember what they have been learning.

## Reading



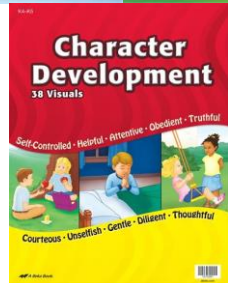
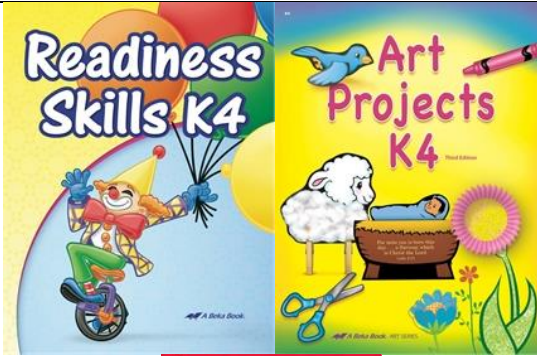
The Little Books start with basic vowel sounds and go onto consonants, blends, words, and simple sentences. These books also include delightful pictures to color and activity pages for review. Most students can complete these books. Reading circles begin second semester.

## Numbers



ABC-123 is a workbook reinforces concepts and formation of numbers 1-20 and counting and coloring familiar objects. Students learn to count to 100, sequence numbers, recognize greater than and less than, names of coins, telling time to the hour, days, months and are introduced to addition by adding 1 to numbers. Phonics-based reading readiness skills are carefully sequenced activities in recognition, sound and formation of long and short vowels, consonants, consonant/vowel blends and one syllable words.

## Skills Development



Reading Readiness Skills 4 help children develop writing readiness, eye-hand coordination, visual perception, and listening and thinking skills.

Art Projects for K4 include basic art concepts with a variety of projects. The projects include coloring, printing, painting, tracing, drawing, and gluing. The projects correlate with academics, Bible, and the seasons.

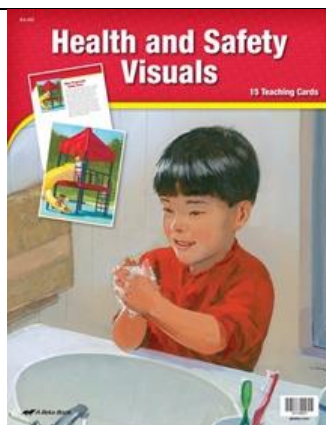
Character development visuals provide good talking points to encourage polite behavior.
